42. Decisional Defaults: Does Regulation Have Them Backwards?

Read the book Nudge, by Richard H. Thaler and Cass R. Sunstein (2008). Its contribution to regulation is potentially profound The authors argue for an apparent paradox: "libertarian paternalism." They want public policy to give people choices (libertarianism) but guide them toward the "right" choices (paternalism). Public policy need neither ignore people's foibles nor coerce their choices; it can "nudge." Nudging requires policymakers to design the right defaults.
